After several challenging years with modified programming and limited community events due to COVID-19, 2022 was about reconnecting with the Lake Country community and trying new things. Lake Country Health continued to deliver our senior and caregiver support services, mental health services and community outreach programs. In addition, our talented Executive Director, Melissa, and our team of fearless employees launched several support groups and a community coffee time in Lake Country to meet the emerging health needs of our community. In 2022, we celebrated our 40th anniversary. It may come as a surprise to many of you that Lake Country Health is 40 years old! The organization was committed from the start to fellowship, socialization, and health for seniors. Some of the services you might be aware of that Lake Country Health played a leading role in include wheels on meals, the Senior's Bus Society, and the local ambulance service. These senior's services have since evolved and expanded to what you see now on offer in Lake Country.

One of Lake Country Health's most significant accomplishments to-date is the approval for funding of a Community Health Centre (CHC) in Lake Country. Over the past year Melissa and the CHC task force have been working tirelessly to secure a site, and these efforts continue. CHCs are non-profit primary care organizations that provide integrated health care and social services, with a focus on addressing the social determinants of health. A CHC will not only respond to our current health needs but build a foundation to grow and adapt to our future needs with the ultimate goal of preventing illness and promoting wellness in Lake Country.

This year we also bid farewell to two very dedicated Board members: Claire Ishoy and Dr. Sana Shahram. During unprecedented times and a rapidly changing landscape, Claire and Sana supported the shift of our organization to one that is ready to take on a CHC. I want to thank them for their dedication and impactful contributions on behalf of the Board. I also extend a warm welcome to our new board members and a big thank you to all the Directors of Lake Country Health for their dedication to our organization.

If you are looking to get involved and make a difference in your community, we would love to have you! We are actively recruiting for volunteers to support our driving and tech angel programs, and we are always looking for local leaders to fill open board positions. OVERVIEW OF 2021-22

Throughout 2021-22, Lake Country Health Society staff continued to offer the programs the organization is well known for, including Better at Home and senior rides, while also experimenting with new programs for the community.

Existing programs continued to grow this year. For example, the number of tax clinic clients more then doubled in 2022, and the demand for seniors services was steady.

The Society offered a number of new events about a range of mental health topics. Events included Naloxone trainings, a movie night featuring the film "Angst," and a presentation about addiction. LCH enjoyed partnering with the Creekside Theater to host a comedy show with "Big Daddy Tazz," who offered a lighthearted take on living with anxiety and ADHD. The community showed strong interest in a presentation Lake Country Health hosted about living with Dementia, which also launched a new collaborative working relationship with Alzheimer's BC.

Client mental health services were expanded in 2022, with the addition of support groups offering novel programs, such as cinema and art therapy series.

May is Caregiver Awareness Month, and as the regional leader in caregiver programming, LCH ran a social media campaign about the topic. The organization also partnered with the local IDA, as well as the Lake Country Alliance and Winfield United Churches to create gift baskets for the caregivers of Lake Country. The caregiver program also expanded this year into Vernon.

Recently, LCH started offering Advanced Care Planning sessions, to help community members to explore and plan for their health care in the scenario whereby people are incapacitated. Community uptake of the sessions were strong, and the program will continue to be offered in person and online.

The Executive Director was fortunate to be a member of the regional leadership team that worked to development the regional poverty reduction strategy, the "Central Okanagan Poverty and Wellness Strategy." The strategy will be used to coordinate actions among municipalities and organizations in the region to address poverty. The development was a great collaborative effort, and LCH looks forward to helping to implement the strategy. The strategy can be found here.

With growing programs and client list, the organization undertook a number of initiatives to streamline and improve operations, adding new software and procedures. LCH expanded and improved communications, starting a new e-newsletter and a new Facebook page. The Society's social media presence now includes Instagram, Facebook, as well as Tiktok, allowing the organization to engage with a broad audience.

To wrap up the calendar year, LCH hosted a Community Christmas Party at the Oyama Community Hall, where many residents met new neighbors and won some great prizes during Christmas Trivia and bingo games. The organization also partnered with Telus to provide Christmas hampers to a number of Lake Country seniors.

In the coming year, Lake Country Health Society aims to continue to adapt and expand our services to meet the needs of the growing community in Lake Country.

As the organization grows, so does the need for volunteers, systems, and program space. In the coming year, the organization will develop an improved volunteer management and training, as well as a new client management systems.

The organization aims to expand mental health supports by offering support groups for grief, depression, anxiety, or other topics based on community need. LCH aspires to offer subsidized or lower cost one on one counselling to all clients sometime in the future.

Seniors aiming to live independently continue to face many challenges, and Lake Country Health aims to expand the services offered to support seniors living in their own homes, as well as their caregivers. In the coming year, the caregiver program will be expanded into Kelowna.

The organization will continue to work on the development of a Community Health Center in Lake Country, through fundraising, public education, and working to find a suitable location to lease.

All program areas depend on volunteers and local funding. The organization continues to be passionate about building community, the wellbeing of seniors, mental health and preventative health care. Considering joining the organization as we work on these issue, by volunteering or making a gift to fund our local programs.

The board, staff and volunteers are excited about the future in Lake Country, and look forward to working together in the coming year.
